The Rotary Club of Princeton is pleased to present this Vocational Scholarship Application which shall be offered under the following guidelines.

The Rotary Vocational Scholarship is intended for a PHS graduating senior who does not plan to attend a four-year college but does intend to further their education in the vocational area following graduation.

SCHOLARSHIP:

- One \$500 nonrenewable scholarship to be paid directly to the student in one payment presented at a special Rotary luncheon for Scholarship recipients.

ELIGIBILITY:

- Student must be currently enrolled at Princeton High School.
- Enrolling in a Tech School / Trade School / or Junior College Vocational Program for Fall 2023.

CONSIDERATIONS:

- Desire to further your education and/or talents for future contributions to others.
- Participation in service projects and/or involvement in PHS Rotary Interact Club.

INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ATTACHMENTS:

- List the community service projects in which you have been involved in and the dates of that involvement. Please include any participation in the Rotary Interact Club.
- Describe briefly what you have learned through serving others and how you have contributed to the welfare of others.
- Provide information in regards to your senior project (if you had one) related to your chosen vocation.
- Please provide the letter of acceptance your chosen tech school, trade school or Junior College.
- Provide (2) Letters of Recommendation – at least one from outside of PHS and no family members.

This objective is set against the **"Rotary 4-way Test"**, used to see if a planned action is compatible with the Rotarian spirit. Rotarian and entrepreneur Herbert J. Taylor developed the test during the Great Depression as a set of guidelines for restoring faltering businesses and was adopted as the standard of ethics by Rotary in 1942. It is still seen as a standard for ethics in business management.
